### Lismore Garden







The 22<sup>nd</sup> "Arbor Day (Tree-Planting Ceremony) of Yamato Takada City" was held on a large scale in the North Area of Takada Multipurpose City Park on September 28. In this park people can see proudly the Eucalyptus tree. It has been brought up out of the seed, which was sent in 1983 from Lismore city here to Yamato Takada city in commemoration of the 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Sister City Exchange Relationship between the two cities.

Yamato Takada city thinks highly of the importance of Green and has come to think that Green should be seen everywhere in the city. And as a result the city has decided that memorial trees should be planted every year "to make the hometown rich in green." As a memorial tree this year a bolt-brush tree (Japanese

name: tree of brush) was planted. This tree is originally Australian, slender flowers blossoming just like brushes washing bolts.



The exchange students from Lismore attended the ceremony of this day.

The Yamato Takada Sister City Association donated the ornaments of kangaroo and koala and a memorial plate as proof of friendship to Yamato Takada city as the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of Sister City Exchange Relationship comes next year. Mr. Yoshida, mayor, along with the exchange students and Mr. and Mrs. Virtue unveiled them.

This place was named "Lismore Garden" under the hope that the memorial trees will grow up larger and taller and the exchange relationship between Lismore and Takada will continue forever and ever.

Around the end of the ceremony various colors of balloons were flown high in the air successively by kindergartners. The rising of the balloons looked like beautiful flowers against the grown-up eucalyptus tree, the view of which was very splendid.





### Lismore Children's Painting Exhibition

About 100 pictures painted by children in Lismore were handed to Mayor Yoshida by the Lismore exchange students who arrived here at Takada at the end of September.

These pictures were in return for the pictures painted by children in Takada, which had been sent to Mayor of Lismore city in July.





The pictures were brilliantly painted in clear colors. They showed beautiful pieces of scenery of Lismore, children playing merrily, cute koalas and so on. The pictures, which were painted by 5 or 6 year-old kids, were exhibited at the kindergartens in Takada city and at the central community hall and also at the Lismore stall in "Genki Week" fair. A lot of Takada citizens enjoyed seeing the pictures painted by Lismore children.

The pictures painted by Takada children were exhibited in the Lismore city library.



The followings are the Lismore students' answers to the questionnaires before their departure.

#### 1. What were your first impressions of Yamatotakada?

• It is a beautiful city that is always busy and filled

with exciting adventures.



• All the bicycles surprised me though. There were many people riding bicycles, ever the elderly.

## 2. What places were most favorite / impressive for sightseeing in Japan?

- Kyoto was absolutely beautiful with much nature. The temples and shops were really cool.
- My favourite day trips would probably have to be the trips to Asaka, Hiroshima and Miyajima Island.
- I loved going and watching traditional Japanese dancing with my host family and my favourite eating place was the sushi and tempura bars!

## 3. What differences were you surprised at in terms of culture/ manners and customs?

#### ★About living:

- The wearing of slippers inside the houses was a considerable change, remembering to take them off when stepping on the Tatami.
- I was surprised at how close together the houses were and how busy the city was.
- · All Japanese seem very polite and formal.

The following remarks are about questionnaires on the exchange program given to host families.

# 1. What were Japanese hosts puzzled about by receiving students from Lismore?

- Language problem is the biggest. We couldn't understand parts of their English.
- We were always worried about what kind of food and dishes they would like.
- Some of the exchange students had likes and dislikes about food.
- We were troubled as to where we should take them or what places they wanted to visit in order to make them happy there.

# 2. What did you fully realize about the difference of culture or manners and customs?

- They were surprised at so many dishes on the table for breakfast and dinner. It seems that breakfast and dinner are a little simple in Australia.
- They were very open- minded and they did everything without getting nervous and feeling shy.
- They acted everything without caring about time.
- They already knew very well about Japan and Japanese culture.

#### 3. What were the things you felt happy with them?

• They said, "You cook very well. I like Japanese food very much. I liked all the dishes you cooked."

#### ★About school life:

- The wearing of slippers within the school was fascinating and very different from the constant use of shoes within Australia.
- The whole class would bow to the teacher before and after every class.
- The teachers moved classed, instead of the students.
- It surprised me at school the passion that the students have to learn.
- They were to meet us and practise their English skills. Also how keen the boys at the schools were to talk to me!

# 4. What impressed you most with regard to your host family?

- The politeness and concern shown by my host family towards me was very nice and welcoming, it allowed me to feel more at home with my new house and living conditions.
- They were also interested to hear about my life in Australia and were always keen to know what I had done after each day trip.

 They would always go out of their way to make sure I was happy and comfortable



- As time passed we could make ourselves in English through gestures and using words only without making sentences. They tried to understand us.
   We really enjoyed .talking to each other.
- We had fun doing a lot of things, such as games, karaoke, playing catch and so on. We were pleased to know that they enjoyed themselves with us.
- We have no daughter, so I felt very happy and new when she said to me at a shopping center, "How do you like this? I like it."
- We went shopping with my exchange student in order to cook a big meat spaghetti which she liked very much, and she helped us very hard to cook the dish. Of course we all of our family members had a good time eating it and having a chat with her.
- In the course of her stay with us she showed more interest in Japan than before she visited us and we could use Japanese more and more.
- When we heard her say, "I intend to come to Japan someday again," and "Next time I visit Japan, I would like to stay here longer than this time," we really became very happy.

## 4. Do you apply for the host family plan if you have another opportunity?

Each host family this time answered to the questionnaire, "We are willing to welcome the exchange student from Lismore if we have an opportunity.



During the period of the Week people had fun enjoying a variety of interesting entertainments held here and there in the city, such as art exhibitions, concerts, agricultural shows and exhibitions of works for sale, different stalls by some organizations, free markets and fire-fighting-fest and so on.



With the aim of having Takada residents know Lismore more, YTLSCA opened "Lismore Stall of Australian Product." at the fair.

The staff members of the association set out some kinds of nuts, cookies, chocolates and salt at the stall, all of which are peculiar to Australia. In addition the native flowers unique to Australia were displayed there this time and many people enjoyed shopping some of the flowers and other things. The staff arranged the flowers on the spot as some of the shoppers asked them to do so, getting a favorable reception by showing them flower arranging.
